

5c. British Values Policy

Rationale

The Lyceum School meets the requirements set out in Part 2 of Schedule 1 to the Education (Independent School Standards) (England) Regulations 2010. Through our SMSC (Spiritual, Moral, Social, and Cultural) provision, we actively promote British Values, as defined by the government: **democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty, mutual respect, and tolerance of different faiths and beliefs.**

The Lyceum School ensures that principles are actively promoted:

- Enable pupils to develop their self-knowledge, self-esteem and self-confidence
- Enable pupils to distinguish right from wrong and to respect the civil and criminal law of England
- Encourage pupils to accept responsibility for their behaviour, show initiative and understand how they can contribute positively to society
- Enable pupils to acquire a broad general knowledge of and respect for public institutions and services in England
- Further tolerance and harmony between different cultural traditions by enabling pupils to acquire an appreciation of and respect for their own and other cultures
- Encourage respect for other people, paying particular regard to the protected characteristics set out in the Equality Act 2010
- Encourage respect for democracy and support for participation in the democratic processes, including respect for the basis on which the law is made and applied in England

These councils provide opportunities to promote and teach respect for democracy and the electoral process • We encourage pupils to take on community roles both in and out of school, such as School Librarians and Council Members, representing the school in decision-making • The beginnings of democracy are taught in History lessons/Topic through research of Ancient Greece/Roman civilisation and the changing role of British monarchs • In KS2 PSHE lessons include looking at the development of the United Nations and the changes in the European Union (see mapping grids at the end of the policy) • Democracy is promoted through PSHE lessons, circle times, council meetings, assemblies and through guest visitors

They are encouraged to make the most of opportunities which allow them to embrace and develop passions in art, music, sport and a range of other interests • In Year 6 there is a Careers Day where pupils are exposed to a range of opportunities and knowledge to inspire them further • Pupils are taught how to keep themselves safe; this is taught from the beginning of their education in Reception through to Year 6 through the PSHE curriculum, circle time, assemblies and external guest speakers. In addition, E-safety is taught and promoted to both pupil and parents • Our Anti-Bullying policy is clear and actively promoted throughout the school community
